Join this workshop for a systemic understanding of the resilience of internationally educated healthcare professi

onals (IEHPs) in Canada faced with threat to their professional identity. We will present the results of research focusing on the resilience of IEHPs who face the double adversity of immigration as adaptation to a new culture and numerous barriers to professional integration in Canada. Based on focus groups with 25 participants and thematic analysis of their reflections in the program Fostering Canadian Integration for IEHPs: From Learning to Action, we examined the individual, relational and social contributors to their resilience. Based on the findings, we offer four learning outcomes in the presentation:

1. Expand resilience to a social ecological concept
2. Understand how self-awareness contributes to resilience
3. Strategies for forming a learning community
4. Learn how to foster a positive mindset and restore a meaningful professional identity for supporting the resilience of IEHPs.

"In recognition of the International Human Rights Day, we will host a two-day hybrid event that aims to combat hate, promote inclusion, and foster understanding among diverse communities. The event will feature a combination of educational sessions, interactive activities, and community showcases. The event will include a combin

ation of panel discussions, keynote addresses and a documentary film screening on real life incidents and experiences of hate and racism in Canada.

Day one of the event will be held online, leveraging our platform to reach a broader audience across multiple provinces. According to Public Safety Canada, Canada continues to experience high rates of community tension, hate crimes, and violence in both global and domestic contexts. Police-reported hate crimes increased by 7%, from 3,355 incidents in 2021 to 3,576 in 2022, following a 72% increase between 2019 and 2021. These incidents, which primarily target Muslim, Jewish, and Black populations, remain above the ten-year average."

Vanessa's research interests lie in community engagement, interprofessional collaboration, learning health systems and integration. She received her Doctor of Nursing from the Lawrence S. Bloomberg Faculty of Nursing, and her thesis explored the relationship between cross-sector integrated care and organizational learning.

Research has shown mental health to be a leading cause of hospitalization among Canadian immigrants, especially refugees. This event presents results from collaborative studies between Statistics Canada and IRCC on mental health–related hospitalization among permanent and temporary residents in Canada. It also showcases how linking IRCC administrative data to hospital discharge records can help monitor migrant health and help with policy decisions.

The presentation aims to answer three important questions:

- How do mental health–related hospitalization rates among permanent residents vary by admission class, year of arrival and region of origin?
- Is the pattern of mental health hospitalization different between permanent residents and temporary residents?
- What other health conditions brought immigrants and temporary residents to hospitals besides mental health?"

Service providers and foster parents may face challenges or feel unprepared when assisting URMs dealing with substance use. This webinar will explore the complexities of substance use among URMs and equip providers and caregivers with effective strategies. It will also provide a brief overview of substance use disorder (SUD) and its prevalence in the countries where URMs commonly originate.

Participants will gain insights into the cultural and contextual factors that influence substance use among URM s, including the effects of migration trauma, acculturation stressors, and stigma. The session will focus on the significance of promoting empathetic strategies and encouraging non-judgmental discussions about substance use. The strategies explored will promote resilience, encourage healthy coping mechanisms, and emphasize the value of open dialogue about substance use.

This webinar will benefit direct service providers and foster parents who work with URM s, along with URM supporters such as volunteers and school staff. This webinar will not include information on diagnosing SUD in a clinical setting; instead, it is intended to be an introductory level webinar for educational and supportive services.
